Honors, Advanced and Advanced Placement (AP) Courses

- Recommended by present teachers
- Overall GPA of 3.0 for academic subjects
- GPA of 3.0 in the specific course area (English, Math, Science, Social Studies, Foreign Lang.)
- Students are expected to earn grades "A" or "B"

New Testing Graduation Requirements for Class of 2018 & Beyond!

In addition to course credits, students must earn points toward graduation on 7 EOY exams.

EOY exams will be given in:

- English I & II
- Algebra I
- Geometry
- Physical Science
- American History
- American Government

Students can earn 1-5 points for each exam.

5=Advanced, 4=Accelerated, 3=Proficient, 2=Basic, 1=Limited Students must accumulate a total of 18 graduation points to

be eligible for a diploma. Pg. 9

College Credit Plus-College Courses for High School Credit

- Students who plan to enroll in college courses using this option should consult with their school counselor concerning the possible risks and consequences of participation in this program.
- Students must secure paperwork and submit the CCP Intent to Participate form prior to April 1st and attend a student/parent meeting with their counselor by designated date.
- Informational meeting will be held on February 10th, 6:00PM at MHS.



PE Waiver



- Students who successfully complete TWO full seasons of <u>interscholastic athletics, marching</u> <u>band, or cheerleading</u> may be excused from the high school physical education requirement
- Two full seasons must be completed by the end of students junior year
- Notify High School Counselor when scheduling on Feb. 22nd if interested

Extracurricular Guidelines

- Eligibility-Minimum of 1.55 GPA or above on a 4.0 system.
- Must pass 5 courses during the prior grading period.
- GPA based on previous quarter's grades.
 - To be eligible for a fall sport a student must earn a minimum of 1.55 GPA on 4th quarter grade card.
 - Must be eligible to participate at the time try-outs occur.

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<u>ENGLISH</u>

- Builds upon the skills of reading, listening, speaking and writing that are needed for post-high school careers and higher education. In addition research skills are broadened and practiced.
- Both fiction and non-fiction literature are studied in-depth. All students will have an opportunity to begin and follow a sequence of courses most appropriate to their educational and career goals.
- The use of technology is infused throughout this course.

Career Search

- All freshmen are required to enroll in the semester class, Career Search, which will meet the high school graduation requirement for 1/2 credit of finance/economics.
- Assess values and resources that support lifestyle goals, effective time management plans, stress management, and multicultural awareness that sustains a productive, meaningful lifestyle
- Goal setting, planning and time management skills will be applied in reference to family and workplace.
- Demonstrates how academic achievement influences personal and career growth, the use of conflict resolution techniques and how to apply social skills that lead to effective school, career and family relationships that lead to a healthy, caring and responsible citizen.

HEALTH and PHYSICAL EDUCATION

- The primary objectives of the Physical Education class are to increase fitness, to learn to enjoy a variety of activities to develop skills of teamwork, cooperation, respect and listening; and to gain confidence in one's personal abilities.
- An attempt is made to include activities in three areas: personal fitness, team sports and lifetime sports.


